MITIGATION STRATEGIES BY SUPPRESSION TYPE

1. Legal & Bureaucratic Suppression

Threats: Anti-protest laws, criminalization of mutual aid, state weaponization of legal processes

Tactics:

- Pre-arranged legal defense collectives and bail funds
- Off-grid organizing: no permits, no official announcements
- Distribute Know-Your-Rights zines widely (in multiple languages)
- Use mobile protest forms: flash mobs, pop-up actions, decentralized marches
- Conduct court-watching, cop-watching, and record suppression hearings

2. Policing & Surveillance Expansion

Threats: Drones, Stingrays, facial recognition, unmarked squads

Tactics:

- Facial obscuring through masks, LEDs, and pattern-disrupting designs
- Pre-mapped blind spots and camera-free zones for regrouping
- Counter-surveillance training for community patrols
- Create Faraday bags for phones; store devices in metal containers
- Use offline comms where possible (walkie-talkies, visual codes)

3. Economic Warfare

Threats: Asset freezing, employment retaliation, denial of public benefits

Tactics:

- Mutual aid networks for housing, food, meds, and emergency funds
- Redundant economic identities: cash-only systems, secondary banking accounts
- Skill-sharing economies (repair, bartering, teaching, care work)
- Anonymous employment collectives or syndicates
- Protect worker-activists through unions or covert co-ops

4. Psychological & Cultural Control

Threats: Fear, isolation, erasure, trauma loops, performative tolerance

Tactics:

- Rebuild memory through zines, oral storytelling, and ritual
- Normalize fear responses and offer communal grounding spaces
- Reframe trauma as intelligence: share debrief tools, healing maps
- Center art, fashion, joy, and rage as tactics, not luxuries
- Amplify “unacceptable” voices and support banned creators

5. Digital Suppression & Algorithmic Targeting

Threats: De-platforming, shadowbanning, AI-based surveillance

Tactics:

- Mirror accounts and build across multiple platforms (e.g., Mastodon, Signal, Matrix)
- Use image-based info sharing (text within memes or comics)
- Create archive clouds that can be restored after takedowns
- Employ encrypted and decentralized hosting (IPFS, Tor)
- Rotate digital identities and switch up posting patterns

6. Narrative Warfare & Media Censorship

Threats: “Both sides” framing, state mouthpiece media, information blackouts

Tactics:

- Train rebel scribes and narrative warfare pods
- Run guerrilla media: zines, pirate radio, anonymous TikToks
- Pre-load social media with counter-narratives before state campaigns hit
- Hijack hashtags, flip slogans, distort regime language into satire
- Archive real events with geotags, footage, and sworn accounts

7. Divide & Fragment Tactics

Threats: False flag infiltration, internal splits, performative inclusion

Tactics:

- Internal security protocols: code names, roles, minimal data exposure
- Conflict mediation circles that avoid carceral logics (call-in, not out)
- Strategic alliances built across difference—disability, race, class, migration status
- Rotate leadership, decentralize decision-making, and avoid hierarchy traps
- Support comrades under pressure, even if disagreement exists

PREPAREDNESS INFRASTRUCTURE TO BUILD

- Legal affinity teams per neighborhood or cell
- Digital resilience teams to restore deplatformed content
- Psychological first aid pods trained in debrief, trauma response
- Community defense formations for rapid deployment
- Cultural resistance teams (poster crews, muralists, poets, media bombers)
